Ron Giere not only was my dissertation advisor, but also played a pivotal role in my becoming a philosopher of science (for better or worse). I was pursuing a PhD degree in mathematics at IU in the Fall of 1980. He was at the time the director of graduate studies. I introduced myself and told him that I wanted to study philosophy of science but that I had no formal training in philosophy.
